### **Prescription Strong (Schedule 8) Opioid Use and Misuse in Australia – Options for a regulatory response Consultation paper**

Australian Government, Jan 2018

This paper will examine the issues around prescription opioid use and misuse in Australia and explore options for a regulatory response to any issues identified, although some areas that have a direct interaction with areas of regulation are addressed. It is noted at the outset that use, and misuse, of opioids is affected by a wider range of factors beyond regulation, but regulation as it relates to demand from patients and supply from prescribers can play an important role in underpinning appropriate use and minimising misuse.

The Fifth National Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Plan endorsed a national approach to address suicide prevention. By acknowledging that suicide prevention is the responsibility of all levels of government – Commonwealth, state and local – and by emphasising the importance of collaboration in all suicide prevention efforts, we hope the Fifth Plan can drive cohesive planning and action to respond to this major public health issue.

### **Australia, An Intoxicated Society: 40 years on from the Baume Report**

Forty years ago, a progressive and prescient Senate Committee report identified alcohol and its harms as a problem of epidemic proportions. In 1977 the Senate Standing Committee on Social Welfare released its report, [Drug Problems in Australia – an intoxicated society?](#) The report is often referred to as the Baume Report since the Committee was chaired by Peter Baume, a physician and then Senator for New South Wales (NSW). ### **The Role of Inpatient Care for Children and Adolescents with Moderate-to-severe Mental Disorders: An Evidence Check rapid review**

Sax Institute for NSW Ministry of Health, Indig D, Gear C, York A, October 2017

A recent Australian survey of the mental health of children and adolescents identified that one in seven (14%) have experienced a mental health disorder in the past year with nearly half of these (5.6%) having a moderate-to-severe disorder. Appropriate care for young people with moderate to severe mental disorders will include a spectrum of services from community-based to inpatient settings. This Evidence Check synthesises the best available research evidence about when inpatient care is the most effective and appropriate form of care for children and adolescents with moderate to severe mental disorders.

### **Mind The Gap: The National Disability Insurance Scheme and psychosocial disability - Final Report: Stakeholder identified gaps and solutions**

University of Sydney and Community Mental Health Australia, January 2018

Many will be left without appropriate mental health support in the transition to the National Disability Insurance Scheme according to a report detailing experiences of consumers, providers and advocacy groups in the mental health sector. The 'Mind the Gap' report, compiled by the University of Sydney and Community Mental Health

Australia, highlights problems with the current state of the NDIS for people with psychosocial disability such as eligibility criteria that exclude many, slow uptake and engagement due to a disconnect between the notion of 'disability' and 'mental health', and inadequate involvement models for carers and families.

### **Indicators of a Thriving Workplace Survey – A Work In Progress**

SuperFriend, Melbourne, 2017

This report provides a snapshot of findings from SuperFriend's third annual survey which tracks the progress of workplace mental health and wellbeing across Australia against the ideal or desired state. The survey uses 38 characteristics or indicators of a workplace environment that are known to be optimal for the mental health of employees and their ability to succeed at work. The 38 indicators cover four fundamental domains – Leadership, Connectedness, Policies & Practices and Capabilities & Culture with 5000 people.

In October 2016, the University of Tasmania's Work, Health and Wellbeing Network convened a workshop with national and international workplace mental health experts to identify initial priorities for the implementation of an integrated approach to workplace mental health which form the basis of this white paper. The workshop was interactive and iterative and resulted in the identification, discussion and final selection of priorities.
